For much of the 17th century, England was in a state of persistent crisis. Between religious ructions, civil war, plague and the recurrent crop failures that accompanied the so-called Little Ice Age, the mid-1600s must count in English history as one of the most difficult periods in which to survive.

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In the early 17th century king and parliament clashed over the issue of religion. In the 17th century, religion was far more important than it is today. It was a vital part of everyday life. Furthermore, there was no toleration in matters of religion. By law, everybody was supposed to belong to the Church of England (though in practice there were many Roman Catholics especially in the Northwest). In 1633 William Laud was made Archbishop of Canterbury.
